My Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Blessings of Easter to All of You!

And here's to April! Spring is finally here, even though some days still don't feel like it. Look outside and you will see a variety of different flowers blooming, trees budding, and other plants starting to sprout. Perhaps you've had a chance to see the cherry blossoms bloom or perhaps you've seen my favorite: magnolia trees bursting to life. Creation is blooming all around us; we just have to look outside.

This season is truly my favorite season! While allergy headaches and sneezing aren't so fun, it's a very grounding time for me. In particular, this early stage of spring blooming that we find ourselves in is my all-time favorite. Yes, seeing the flowers later in their full glory is beautiful but there's just something so amazing about seeing the tiny green buds start to peek out amid the dirt. It reminds me that "this too shall pass." t reminds me that the darkness of the winter is only temporary; that the warmth and new life of spring will indeed come back. This liminal space between the bleak winter and the full bloom of spring is a time that invites hope.

At first glance, this sense of hope feels in stark contrast to the Season of Lent in which we find ourselves. During Lent, we are often alone in the wilderness, wandering, reflecting on our mortality and how we live our lives. The Lenten Season begins every year with a somber reminder that we are just dust and one day, to dust we shall return. It is often a season associated with sacrifice, self-denial, and wandering in the desert with Jesus. However, I think there are more similarities between a hopeful spring and a somber Lent than it first appears. After all, the word *Lent* can be traced back to Old English, where it meant "spring season" or "lengthening of days." Indeed, Lent is springtime for our souls, for our spirituality, and for our relationship with God and one another.

As the flowers continue toward full bloom over the next few weeks, I think our spiritual lives are also in a process of becoming. Lent is not just about being in the wilderness; it is also a time of preparing our hearts and minds for the new life: the resurrection on Easter morning. This season we are in is about tending to the soil of our souls, allowing God to work within us, making space for the new growth.

Before we know it, in just three weeks, we will arrive at Easter morning, and we will celebrate the ultimate renewal: Jesus' victory over death. Just like the spring season, Easter reminds us that God is always bringing forth new life, even when we can't yet see it. As we journey closer and closer to Easter, I want to challenge all of you to see where new life is starting to bloom within you and around you and to reflect on where you see glimpses of spring, signs of new life, and reminders of resurrection within this liminal phase in which we're living.

Right now in the United States, 400,000 children are in foster care programs in the United States and more than 270,000 more enter these programs every year. While some kids "age out," the total number of children is continuing to grow. Youth entering foster care often carry their belongings in trash bags, and they continue to do so for moveafter-move making them feel more and more like "throw-aways."

Comfort Cases, a nonprofit organization, was founded on the vision of eliminating this indignity and ensuring that no child ever has to carry his or her belongings in a trash bag. I learned of this organization, whose national headquarters is right here in Gaithersburg, while trying to donate some extra suitcases, and I found the workers there to be an amazing group of volunteers!

What is a *Comfort Case*? It is a backpack or small duffel bag that provides dignity to youth in foster care. These cases are packed with needed supplies, including new pajamas, undergarments, toiletries, etc. Yep, toiletries — a match made in heaven for Wesley Grove UMC! I delivered a large box of our collection and the workers were thrilled. In fact. I agreed on behalf of Wesley Grove to continue to provide these items as we collect them. Spring and summer vacations are coming! Please remember to collect the small bottles of shampoo, conditioner, lotion, mouthwash, body wash, and the mini bars of soap from your hotel rooms while traveling. We are also collecting new toothbrushes,



Previous Minutes: The minutes from our January meeting, as printed in the February newsletter, were approved by all members.

Old Business: We voted to move our bimonthly Finance Committee and Administrative Council meetings from Monday nights to Wednesday nights.

New Business: Steven reviewed the nine issues to be voted on at this year's BWC Annual Conference in May. He gave us a brief summary of the content, and we then discussed how he should vote on each issue.

Committee Reports:

Communications — Greeting cards continue to be sent to those in need and our church website is up-to-date with Holy Week information.

Education — Lenten book study is underway with *The Message of Jesus*, by Adam Hamilton, and is being taught during Sunday School and on Tuesday evenings at Mt. Tabor. Sunday school attendance continues to average 12 each Sunday and Tuesday nights average about 6-7.

Fellowship — Last Saturday's Games Night at Rick and Tammy's home was fun and attended by 17. Becky and Brian will prepare and serve breakfast after the

Sonrise Service on Easter Sunday.

Finance — February collection plate offerings were very low, which is usual for this month. We discussed the current large expenses of snow removal, a new parsonage furnace, and tree removal in the parsonage backyard. MoCo Gov't recently mailed property assessments for our two rental properties, and as expected, they both will increase by 17.7% over the next three years.

Lay Leadership — No new report this month.

Ministry — We met on January 16, but due to several absences and some confusion as to the organization of this new committee, we are reconvening tomorrow night to plan the church calendar from now until July.

Missions — Supplying personal care products to *Comfort Cases* is our Lenten Season mission project. Our Sunday School class began in March collecting many of the items that this organization requests. A basket is in the vestibule to collect these items from congregants.

SPRC — We met last week to complete quarterly reviews of our two pastors and their yearly goals.

Trustees — We have met with DSA Commissioners concerning this spring's use and maintenance of the ballfield and pavilion and an annual donation to the church. One in the amount of \$2,000 was received yesterday. Trustees will begin to obtain estimates for the removal of the smokehouse and backyard tunnel with ground backfill on the Staley Rental Property. We have HVAC service contracts in place with GAC and Tri-State on all four buildings and service dates have been set. The parsonage oil furnace will need to be replaced in the near future. The large tree in the parsonage backyard will be removed due to rot and falling limbs.

Worship — Our charge's Maundy Thursday Service will be held at Salem UMC and our Good Friday Service will be held at Mt. Tabor UMC, both at 7 pm. Sonrise Service will begin here at 6:15 am.

Pastors' Reports: Pastor Nick reflected on our combined Ash Wednesday service, safety presentation, confirmation class, and upcoming Holy Week Services. It is good to worship and fellowship with other local UM churches. Confirmation service will be on June 1 at Damascus UMC. He also shared that he has visited with six congregants and called many on the phone. Our Lenten book study is going well and he is currently preparing to teach a four-week study on the Irish/Celtic missionary church culture of the Middle Ages.

Closure: Pastor Nick will lead devotions at our next meeting on Wednesday, May 7, at 7 pm. Bob adjourned this meeting at 8:37 pm.
